Whether their "conversion" is genuine or not, this doesn't change the fact that women are significantly better at sequestering these feelings and emotions. we all ultimately want to believe that someone has changed, even if they haven't really changed that much. So pursuing fleshly desires is very much something that everyone can relate to and I believe it's also part of why you might feel like it's ignored or brushed over. It's viewed as something everyone is dealing with at some point, an opportunity to label that as your past provide you a freedom to not be defined by that identity now.

Keep in mind how humans handle shame. A woman who rode the CC as you say, would have the most incentive to fully embrace the traditional/conservative view. This protection offers them meaning/acceptance and increases their respective value within the community.
