I'm sure you had a lot of fun in college, but if you were waking up at 5 am five days a week, you weren't living the "*Animal House* lifestyle." (That's a good thing.)

For the younger guys, let's examine OP's weekly schedule on an hourly basis:

5-6 hours per day on school assignments = 25-30 hours of homework per week

lifting (conservative estimate of 1 hr every weekday morning) = 5 hr per week

classes (average) 12.5 hr per week
